[Notice dated 6th June, 1951, and published in Papua and New Guinea Govt. Gaz. of 14th June, 1951.]

Forestry Ordinance 1936-1937 of the Territory of New Guinea.

TIMBER RIGHTS.

WHEREAS by sub-section (2.) of section 9 of the *Forestry Ordinance 1936-1937* of the Territory of New Guinea, it is provided that the Administrator may, by notice in the *Gazette*, declare any land as to which timber rights have been acquired under sub-section (1.) of the said section to be Administration Land for the purposes of the said Ordinance:

And whereas timber rights have been acquired under sub-section (1.) of the said section as to the land described in the Schedule hereto:

Now therefore, I, Jack Keith Murray, Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, do hereby declare the land described in the Schedule hereto to be Administration Land for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

PART C: FORESTRY—

THE SCHEDULE.

An area of approximately 1,800 acres commencing at a point on the coast being the south-eastern corner of Cutarp Plantation thence bounded on the east by high-water mark along the coast to Cape Jacquinot thence on the south by high-water mark along the coast to a point approximately 100 chains west of Cape Jacquinot thence on the west and north by lines bearing approximately 37 degrees magnetic for approximately 80 chains approximately 67 degrees magnetic for approximately 90 chains approximately 104 degrees magnetic for approximately 100 chains to the point of commencement.

WHEREAS by sub-section (2) of section 9 of the *Forestry Ordinance* 1936-1937 of the Territory of New Guinea, it is provided that the Administrator may, by notice in the *Gazette*, declare any land as to which timber rights have been acquired under sub-section (1) of the said section to be Administration Land for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

And whereas timber rights have been acquired under sub-section (1) of the said section as to the land described in the Schedule hereto:

Now therefore, I, Jack Keith Murray, Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, do hereby declare the land described in the Schedule hereto to be Administration Land for the purposes of the said Ordinance.

THE SCHEDULE.

Being an area of about 28,000 acres known as the Mandres Timber Purchase Area commencing at a point being the intersection of the Valili River and the south-east boundary of the Vunapaldig Native Reserve thence bounded on the east by the western bank of the Valili River upstream for approximately nine miles to the water-shed of the Valili and the Toriu Rivers in the vicinity of Old Mainum Village, thence on the south and in a generally north-westerly direction along the divide between the Valili River and Toriu River and the Tavalue River and the Toriu River for approximately eight miles to a point on the divide between the Toriu and the Tavalue Rivers and the Ramandu River thence on the west in a generally northerly direction by the divide between the Tavalue and the Ramandu River for approximately five miles to the head-waters of the Takwis (Mandres) River thence along the right bank of the Takwis River for approximately four miles to the point of intersection of the Takwis River and the south boundary of the Mandres Reserve thence on the north by the southern boundaries of the Mandres Reserve Mandres Freehold and the Vunapaldig Native Reserve to the point of commencement.

THE SCHEDULE.

All that piece of ground containing approximately 22,000 acres situated on the Huon Peninsula in the vicinity of Lae in the District of Morobe commencing at the mouth of the Busu River and bounded thence on the west by the eastern bank of the said Busu River upstream generally northerly for approximately 8 miles to the junction of the Sankwep River thence again on the west by the eastern bank of the said Sankwep River upstream generally northerly for approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles thence on the north by a straight line bearing 149 degrees for approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles to a marker thence by a straight line bearing 73 degrees for approximately 1 mile to a marker on the east bank of the Buim River thence by a straight line bearing 120 degrees for approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to a marker at the junction of the Budum Creek and Bunga River thence on the east by the western bank of the said Bunga River downstream generally southerly for approximately 6 miles to high-water mark on the northern shore of the Huon Peninsula thence generally on the south by the said shore at high-water mark generally westerly for approximately 3 miles to the point of commencement excepting that piece of land reserved for native use containing approximately 1,600 acres commencing at a marker at the junction of the Bumbi and Buaru Creeks and on the west bank of the Buaru Creek and bounded thence on the west by the western bank of the Buaru Creek to a marker on its western bank near Yangga hamlet thence on the north by a straight line to a marker on the east bank of the Bupu River near the road from Yangga hamlet thence on the east by the eastern bank of the Bupu River generally southerly for approximately $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles to a marker on the east bank of the Bupu River approximately $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles from the mouth of the Bupu River thence on the south by a straight line to the point of commencement.

THE SCHEDULE.

An area of approximately 12,300 acres commencing at a marked tree on a kunai ridge bearing approximately 5 degrees magnetic for approximately 174 chains from the Wau-Labu Road Bridge over the Garogos River and bounded thence by a straight line bearing magnetic east for approximately 15 chains to a dry creek bed thence on the south-east and south by the right-hand bank of the creek and by the right-hand bank of the Garogos River to its junction with the Wampit River thence on the west by the right-hand bank of the Wampit River generally north and north-east for approximately 600 chains to a marked tree on the Wampit River thence on the north-east by a straight line bearing approximately 130 degrees magnetic for approximately 230 chains to the point of commencement.

An area of approximately 5,600 acres of forested country in the headwaters of the Lisatoka Creek and Gomahiga River commencing at Mount Gisauka a mountain approximately $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles north-east of Goroka thence by a line due north to its intersection with the scrub edge thence following the scrub edge across the Gomahiga River and Lisatoka Creek to a picket on a spur approximately 10 chains north-east of the main junction of Lisatoka Creek thence following up the spur generally north-west to the watershed of Lisatoka Creek thence following along the watersheds of Lisatoka Creek and Gomahiga River in a general easterly direction to Mount Otto thence along the watershed of Gomahiga River generally south-westerly to Mount Gisauka (the point of commencement).
