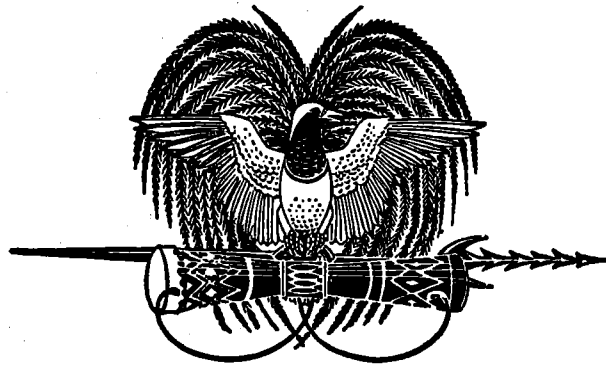

A person aggrieved by or who wishes to object to the division of a town into zones by this notice, may within three (3) months, after the date of the publication in the *National Gazette* of this notice, appeal to the Minister for Lands.

EXPLANATORY NOTE**MINISTERIAL REARRANGEMENT**

1. There are thirteen main Ministries and six others. The thirteen main Ministries are:—

2. These main ministries have been given responsibilities over functions of Public Service Departments and other governmental agencies and bodies.

For example, functions of the Department of Forests are placed within the Ministry of Primary Industry. The Electricity Commission as government agency or body, is now the ministerial responsibility of the Minister for Public Utilities.

3. Some of the main ministries are allocated certain governmental bodies or agencies which are independent of any day to day control or direction of Ministers.

For example, the Public Services Commission and courts are independent bodies. Functions of Ministers over such bodies only relates to the following matters:

- (a) Ministers are responsible for determining governmental policies and ensuring that these are implemented. The actual method and day to day carrying out of those policies would remain the responsibility of the body and not the Minister.
- (b) Ministers would be spokesmen for such bodies in Parliament or in the public.
- (c) Ministers would carry out functions that require ministerial action by law.
- (d) Ministers would have no control or direction over professional matters handled by such bodies or office holders.

4. There are six other Ministers (plus an Assistant Minister) who have responsibilities over some matters that come under certain of the thirteen main ministries. Certain matters taken out of the main ministries and placed under other Ministers will mean the following things—

- (a) the particular matter becomes the sole responsibility of the latter Minister. Thus, the Minister for Corrective Institutions and Liquor Licensing will have sole responsibility of the Corrective Institutions and Liquor Licensing functions of the Ministry of Justice. The Minister for Justice would have no responsibility over the two matters. However, in such cases team work should prevail.
- (b) The Minister solely responsible for a particular matter should keep the Minister responsible for the main ministry informed of any major policy initiatives or major policy changes.

The Ministers listed in Column 1 would solely be responsible for matters placed within their responsibilities but are requested to observe the guideline set out in paragraph 4(b) and arrange suitable working relationships with the Ministers listed in Column 2.

5. There is only one Assistant Minister in the re-arrangement and this is the "Minister assisting the Prime Minister (Provincial Affairs and Local Government)". In this case the responsible Minister is the Prime Minister who is delegating or allocating his responsibilities over Provincial Affairs and Local Government to Mr. N. E. Olewale.

This means that Mr. Olewale will carry out the ministerial functions over Provincial Affairs and Local Government. However, the Prime Minister should be consulted and kept informed by the Assistant Minister in most actions taken. The Prime Minister can exercise the Ministerial functions of Provincial and Local Government at any time.

6. All Ministers have equal status (except the Prime Minister and the Deputy Prime Minister). Furthermore, all ministers have the same terms and conditions of service (except the Prime Minister). In the re-arrangement the status and terms and conditions of service existing on 9th December, 1975 continue to apply after 10th December, 1975 and even after 18th December, 1975. There is no minor ministry or junior minister.

7. The main changes in the re-arrangement are the placing of more responsibilities on certain Ministers. Other Ministers have less responsibility.

PART I.—INTRODUCTORY

The National Investment Priorities Schedule is published in accordance with Part III of the *National Investment and Development Act 1974*.

It is multipurpose document, intended both for foreign investors and for the different Government departments and authorities concerned with foreign investment. It informs investors of the Government's attitude toward foreign investment in the economy and, particularly, the specific activities and sectors which are being given priority and in which new foreign investment is actively being sought.

It also clarifies for the many different arms of Government the activities in which foreign investment is either to be encouraged or is acceptable and those in which it is not.

The Second National Investment Priorities Schedule reflects the initial priorities for an independent Papua New Guinea, detailing those activities where an important role for new foreign investment is envisaged, those in which it will continue to be permitted, those in which it will be restricted and those which are reserved for Papua New Guineans. The Schedule classifies business activities into four groups:—

1. PRIORITY ACTIVITIES.

These are the activities in which foreign investment is presently being actively sought by the Government of Papua New Guinea. Foreign investment in these activities is considered to be an important component of Papua New Guinea's development programmes over the coming years. The guidelines and minimum terms and conditions regarding foreign investment participation in these priority activities are outlined in Part II of the Schedule.

2. PERMITTED ACTIVITIES.

These are other activities in which new foreign investment will be permitted. They include activities which are not considered to be priority, but in which the Government recognises that foreign investment may be required for some time to come. They also include activities which the Government has not yet evaluated but which may, in the future, be actively encouraged if net benefits to Papua New Guinea can be clearly established. Guidelines and minimum terms and conditions are detailed in Part III of the Schedule.

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued**3. RESTRICTED ACTIVITIES.**

These are the activities in which the Government feels that Papua New Guinean groups or individuals can and should be actively involved, but which also may continue to require foreign expertise and capital. As a general rule, foreign investment in these activities will be permitted only if it is in the form of a joint venture with a Papua New Guinean group or individual. In cases where Papua New Guinean equity is not immediately available or where viability is uncertain, a foreign investor can seek registration with no local participation, provided that he is willing to agree to a specific programme of Papua New Guinean equity involvement over time.

4. RESERVED ACTIVITIES.

These are the activities which are reserved for Papua New Guinean investment. Foreign investors will not be permitted to undertake new ventures in these activities. Existing foreign enterprises engaged in these activities may not expand their operations beyond normal sales growth without Government approval.

PART II.—PRIORITY ACTIVITIES*Division 1.—Categories of Priority Activities.*

The following list specifies the activities in which the Government is actively seeking new foreign investment:—

A. EXPLORATION FOR MINERALS.

Exploration for minerals and ancillary activities including—

- (a) in the case of the Ok Tedi prospect (Western Province)—completion of development drilling and evaluation programme, leading to feasibility study and financing of mine and mill construction; and
- (b) in the case of the Tifalmin prospect (West Sepik Province)—continued exploration and development drilling.

B. EXPLORATION FOR NATURAL HYDROCARBONS.

Exploration for natural hydrocarbons and ancillary activities.

C. FORESTS.

Major timber projects and ancillary activities including—

- Vanimo Timber Rights Purchase Area (West Sepik Province)
- Kapiura Timber Rights Purchase Area (West New Britain Province)
- Kapuluk Timber Rights Purchase Area (West New Britain Province)
- Kumusi Timber Rights Purchase Area (Northern Province)

D. FISHING.

Offshore fishing and further processing of fish.

E. AGRICULTURE.

- Cultivation and processing of green and black tea.
- Cultivation of legume and grain crops.
- Cultivation of root crops for processing.
- Cultivation and further processing of oil palm.
- Cultivation and further processing of sugar cane.

F. MANUFACTURE.*1. Agro-based industries.*

Division 2.—*Standard Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions of Priority Activities.*

GUIDELINES.

(1) As a general rule, no agreement between the Government of Papua New Guinea and a foreign enterprise will be incorporated in an Act of Parliament.

(2) As a general rule, an enterprise will be expected to provide its own capital requirements from sources outside of Papua New Guinea.

(3) In the appraisal of proposals, an enterprise's record of employer/employee relationships may be taken into account.

(4) Where relevant, the technology utilized should be the most labour-intensive determined to be economically feasible.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

A foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a priority activity may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

- (a) Government or Papua New Guinean equity participation; and
- (b) training of Papua New Guineans for all levels of employment under a specific programme; and
- (c) involvement of employees in decision-making relating to terms and conditions of employment; and
- (d) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in establishing ancillary businesses; and
- (e) utilization of supplies and services available within Papua New Guinea; and
- (f) environmental controls; and
- (g) the drawing up of all agreements and arrangements and trade practices; and
- (h) keeping of books of account and business records in Papua New Guinea and in the English language.

Division 3.—*Additional Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Exploration for Minerals.*

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued**GUIDELINES.**

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in priority activities, the following guidelines apply to foreign investment in mineral exploration:—

- (a) the Government has adopted the following three basic principles relating to the utilization of mineral resources:—
 - (i) minerals under the earth and water belong to the people of Papua New Guinea, and the Government and people must receive a fair price in return for the extraction of those materials;
 - (ii) foreign enterprises, whose expertise and capital are needed for commercial exploitation of mineral deposits, should receive a reasonable return on their investment, but any extra-ordinary gains unrelated to extra money inputs (such as a rise during a period of high world market prices) will go in a very large part to the Government;
 - (iii) the Government has the right to regulate the activities of mining enterprises in such a way as will maximise the benefits of mining to the local community while minimising the potentially harmful social and economic costs;
- (b) for large-scale exploration, Prospecting Authorities may be granted by the Minister for Mines and Energy for periods of up to two years, with renewal dependent on satisfactory completion of agreed work programmes and satisfactory proposals for additional work to be performed;
- (c) proposals for mining will normally proceed by way of an Agreement with the Government setting out particular tax and other arrangements for each project and providing for the issue of a mining lease and such agreements will be subject to Parliamentary ratification only to the extent necessary in view of existing legislation;
- (d) major elements in the Government's consideration of proposals for mining agreements will include—
 - (i) satisfactory tax arrangements, including some revenue to the Government from the start of production; and
 - (ii) a firm commitment to proceed with development of the project as rapidly as possible; and
 - (iii) the developer to pay for required infrastructure; and
 - (iv) satisfactory arrangements with respect to labour relations, training, environmental control, and other social issues;
- (e) the Government welcomes foreign investors interested in undertaking exploration in areas not presently held under prospecting authorities or other mining titles by other enterprises.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in exploration for minerals will be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to—

- (a) the performance of a minimum work programme as laid down by the Minister for Mines and Energy; and
- (b) an additional profits tax to be charged after total investment has been recouped with interest equal to a 'reasonable return' in the industry,

and may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to—

- (c) provision of new infrastructure or compensation to the Government for new infrastructure provided; and
- (d) processing of minerals within Papua New Guinea.

Division 4.—*Additional Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Exploration for Natural Hydrocarbons.*

GUIDELINES.

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in priority activities, the following guidelines apply to foreign investment in exploration for natural hydrocarbons:—

- (a) policy for the petroleum sector is currently undergoing detailed review and will be finalized in early 1976; the Minister for Finance has indicated that petroleum exploration and production will be undertaken in the private sector and that revenue to the Government will be derived largely from company income tax and an additional tax charged on cash flows after certain threshold returns have been achieved; new licences will be offered for bidding prior to allocation;
- (b) offshore prospecting licences will be granted for a six year initial period, renewable and with regular relinquishments;
- (c) onshore legislation will be amended in the near future to bring it broadly into line with the provisions of the offshore legislation.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in exploration for natural hydrocarbons will be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to—

- (a) the performance of a minimum work programme as laid down by the Minister for Mines and Energy; and

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued

- (b) an additional profits tax to be charged after total investment has been recouped with interest equal to a 'reasonable return' in the industry,
and may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to—
- (c) provision of new infrastructure or compensation to the Government for new infrastructure provided; and
- (d) processing of natural hydrocarbons within Papua New Guinea.

Division 5.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Major Timber Projects.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a major timber project may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in establishing business associated with the timber projects and directly connected with the main timber operations; and
- (b) reforestation programmes; and
- (c) provision of new infrastructure or compensation to the Government for new infrastructure provided; and
- (d) provision of export marketing expertise or access to export markets and guaranteed minimum export levels; and
- (e) processing of timber extracted within Papua New Guinea; and
- (f) a time programme for the establishment of all industrial plant and infrastructural facilities and minimum production levels.

*Division 6.—Additional Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Fishing Activities.***GUIDELINES.**

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in priority activities, the following guidelines apply to foreign investment in fishing activities:—

- (a) new fishing activities by foreign enterprises in Papua New Guinea's waters will be permitted only if they—
- (i) take place in conjunction with the development of onshore facilities for processing catch; or
 - (ii) are in support of or integrated with the activities of Papua New Guinean fishermen;
- (b) licences to use a boat for fishing are issued for a period of one year and are renewable.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in fishing activities may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in fishing ventures; and
- (b) provision of export marketing expertise or access to export markets; and
- (c) processing of fish in Papua New Guinea.

Division 7.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Priority Agricultural Projects.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a priority agricultural activity may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to one or both of the following:—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in cultivation of similar or identical agricultural products; and
- (b) processing of the agricultural product being cultivated.

Division 8.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Priority Manufacturing Activities.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a priority manufacturing activity may be required to agree to a term and condition relating to provision of export marketing expertise or access to export markets.

Division 9.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Priority Construction Activities.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in the construction of dwellings may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guinean construction businesses; and
- (b) the design and construction of dwellings as laid down by the Government.

Division 10.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Priority Shipping Activities.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in priority activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in priority shipping activities may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to vessel operations as laid down by the Maritime Division, Department of Transport.

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued**PART III.—PERMITTED ACTIVITIES***Division 1.—Categories of Permitted Activities.*

The following list specifies the categories of activities in which new foreign investment will be permitted, but which are not priority activities actively being promoted by the Government at this time:—

A. FORESTS.

Extraction of timber for utilization in a priority timber-based industry.

B. AGRICULTURE.

Nucleus estates.

Agricultural activities integrated with other further processing activities.

Nucleus estates and agricultural activities integrated with other further processing activities.

C. AGRO AND MARINE BASED INDUSTRIES.

Manufacture of instant coffee.

Collection and marketing of prawns and lobsters.

Culturing of pearls.

Tobacco growing.

D. CONSTRUCTION.

Construction activities, involving contracts in excess of K50,000.00 and those less than K50,000.00 which require specialist expertise.

Hotel/Motel/building construction.

E. PROFESSIONAL/TECHNICAL SERVICES.

An activity involving the provision of a professional or technical service.

F. MINOR ACTIVITIES.

An activity (not being an activity in which business by a foreign enterprise is otherwise allowed), involving an estimated capital investment not exceeding K75,000.00.

G. ACTIVITIES RESULTING FROM ACQUISITION OF CERTAIN ASSETS.

An activity carried on by an enterprise (not being an activity in which business by a foreign enterprise is otherwise allowed) substantially through the use of any asset which is the same activity that was carried on through the use of that asset by another foreign enterprise immediately before 6th December, 1974.

H. ACTIVITIES APPROVED BY THE MINISTER FOR NATIONAL DEVELOPMENT.

An activity (not being an activity in which business by a foreign enterprise is otherwise allowed or which is a reserved activity) which is approved in writing by the Minister for National Development, after consultation with the appropriate Minister(s).

*Division 2.—Standard Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions for Permitted activities.***GUIDELINES.**

(1) As a general rule, no agreement between the Government of Papua New Guinea and a foreign enterprise will be incorporated in an Act of Parliament.

(2) As a general rule, an enterprise will be expected to provide its own capital requirements from sources outside of Papua New Guinea.

(3) In the appraisal of proposals, an enterprise's record of employer/employee relationships may be taken into account.

(4) Where relevant, the technology utilized should be the most labour-intensive determined to be economically feasible.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

A foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a permitted activity may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

(a) Government of Papua New Guinean equity participation; and

(b) training of Papua New Guineans for all levels of employment under a specific programme; and

(c) involvement of employees in decision-making relating to terms and conditions of employment; and

(d) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in establishing ancillary businesses; and

(e) utilization of supplies and services available within Papua New Guinea; and

(f) environmental controls; and

(g) the drawing up of all agreements and arrangements and trade practices; and

(h) keeping of books of account and business records in Papua New Guinea and in the English language.

Division 3.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Permitted Timber Projects.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in permitted activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in permitted timber projects may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

(a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in establishing businesses associated with the timber projects and directly connected with the main timber operations; and

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued

- (b) reforestation programmes; and
- (c) provision of new infrastructure or compensation to the Government for new infrastructure provided; and
- (d) provision of export marketing expertise or access to export markets and guaranteed minimum export levels; and
- (e) processing of timber extracted within Papua New Guinea.

Division 4.—Additional Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Permitted Agricultural Activities.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in permitted activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a permitted agricultural activity may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to one or both of the following:—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in cultivation of similar or identical agricultural products; and
- (b) processing of the agricultural product being cultivated.

*Division 5.—Additional Guideline and Minimum Terms and Conditions Applicable to Permitted Marine-Based Industries.***GUIDELINES.**

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in permitted activities, the following guideline applies to foreign investment in permitted marine-based industries:—

New marine-based activities by foreign companies in Papua New Guinea's waters will be permitted only if they—

- (a) take place in conjunction with the development of onshore facilities; or
- (b) are in support of or integrated with the activities of Papua New Guinean fishermen.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

In addition to the standard minimum terms and conditions for foreign investment in permitted activities, a foreign enterprise wishing to engage in permitted marine-based industries may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

- (a) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in marine ventures; and
- (b) provision of export marketing expertise or access to export markets; and
- (c) processing of the product in Papua New Guinea.

Division 6.—Additional Guidelines Applicable to Minor Activities.

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in permitted activities, the following guidelines apply to foreign investment in minor activities:—

- (a) the estimated capital investment in the new undertaking must not exceed K75,000.00;
- (b) applications for registration will be considered only if—
 - (i) the undertaking is consistent with the Government's policies and guidelines relating to economic development and foreign investment; and
 - (ii) benefits will accrue to the economy as a result of the undertaking; and
 - (iii) Papua New Guineans are not prepared to carry out the activity in the particular area; and
 - (iv) the undertaking is desired in the particular area.

Division 7.—Additional Guidelines Applicable to Activities Resulting from Acquisition of Certain Assets.

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in permitted activities, the following guidelines apply to activities for an enterprise resulting from acquisition of assets used by another foreign enterprise for the same activity before 6th December, 1974:—

- (a) the enterprise must seek registration with NIDA before engaging in that activity;
- (b) as a general rule, the carrying on of business in that activity will be permitted only if Papua New Guineans are not prepared or able to carry on business in that activity;
- (c) as a general rule, enterprises with Papua New Guinean partners or Papua New Guinean equity participation will be given preference in relation to application for registration to engage in that activity.

Division 8.—Additional Guidelines Applicable to Activities Approved by the Minister for National Development.

In addition to the standard guidelines for foreign investment in permitted activities, the following guidelines apply to activities approved by the Minister for National Development:—

- (a) an activity will be approved by the Minister for National Development only after consultation with the appropriate Minister;

Second National Investment Priorities Schedule—continued

(b) an activity will not be approved unless—

- (i) foreign investment in the activity is consistent with the Government's policies and guidelines relating to economic development and foreign investment; and
- (ii) clear net benefits will accrue to the country; and
- (iii) Papua New Guineans are not prepared to undertake the activity; and
- (iv) the activity is desired in the particular area in which it will be located.

PART IV.—RESTRICTED ACTIVITIES*Division 1.—Categories of Restricted Activities.*

The following list specifies the particular activities in which, as a general rule, new foreign investment will be restricted to enterprises with substantial Papua New Guinean equity or joint venture partnerships between foreigners and Papua New Guineans:—

- Coffee plantations.
- Rubber plantations.
- Sago cultivation and processing.
- Inshore fishing.
- Inland fishing and fish farming.
- Spice growing.
- Crocodile farming.
- Silk worm cultivation.
- Processing of cocoa (collection through to dry bean).
- Processing of copra (collection through to dry copra).
- Processing of coffee (collection through to green bean).
- Tea packaging for the home market.
- Coffee roasting, grinding and packaging.
- Taverns.
- Urban trade stores.
- Retailing and wholesaling businesses involving investment of less than K25,000.00.
- Hire, repair and maintenance of vending and amusement machines.
- Boot and shoe repairing.
- Amusement parlours.
- General construction work, excluding civil engineering projects, involving contracts not exceeding K50,000.00 other than those not exceeding K50,000.00 which require specialist expertise not available to Papua New Guinean contractors.
- Restaurants and take-away food bars involving investments of less than K25,000.00.
- Plant and equipment hire.

*Division 2.—Guidelines and Minimum Terms and Conditions for Restricted Activities.***GUIDELINES.**

- (1) Foreign enterprises wishing to engage in a restricted activity must, as a general rule, have substantial (more than 25%) Papua New Guinean equity initially. Exceptions will be made—
 - (a) where Papua New Guinean equity is not immediately available; and
 - (b) where viability of the undertaking is yet to be established.
- (2) Applications for registration will be considered only if—
 - (a) Papua New Guineans are not prepared to undertake the activity on their own; and
 - (b) the undertaking is desired in the particular area where it will be located.
- (3) As a general rule, joint venture partnerships between local and foreign groups or individuals will be given preference in relation to application for registration to engage in the activity.
- (4) In the appraisal of proposals, the enterprise's record of employer/employee relationships may be taken into account.
- (5) The technology utilized should be the most labour-intensive determined to be economically feasible.

MINIMUM TERMS AND CONDITIONS.

A foreign enterprise wishing to engage in a restricted activity will be required to agree to a term and condition relating to Government or Papua New Guinean equity participation. In addition, it may be required to agree to terms and conditions relating to all or any of the following:—

- (a) training of Papua New Guineans for all levels of employment under a specific programme; and
- (b) involvement of employees in decision-making relating to terms and conditions of employment; and
- (c) encouragement and assistance to Papua New Guineans in establishing ancillary businesses; and
- (d) utilization of supplies and services available within Papua New Guinea; and
- (e) environmental controls; and
- (f) the drawing up of all agreements and arrangements and trade practices; and
- (g) keeping of books of account and business records in Papua New Guinea and in the English language.

PART V.—RESERVED ACTIVITIES

- Purchase of copra (grower to factory or exporter).
- Purchase of cocoa (grower to factory or exporter).
