

Civil session of April 8<sup>th</sup> 1913

Charlie Kalmet, native of Eraker, assisted by  
M<sup>r</sup> J. Courvin, plaintiff;

versus

Leir Roux, mate of the 'Albatross', Vaka, Defendant,  
not appearing.

At 4 P.M. on April 8<sup>th</sup> 1913 the Joint Court  
composed of the President, the Court of Boue  
E'speranza; the French Judge, Jean Colonna;  
the British Judge, T. E. Roseby;  
in presence of the Public Prosecutor, Count Andino;  
M<sup>r</sup> Bengel, Registrar, recording;  
sitting in a civil case, as a court of first & last  
instance, having duly deliberated, delivered  
the following judgment:

The Joint Court:

Having heard the plaintiff, by M<sup>r</sup> J. Courvin,  
in his claims; nothing for the defendant, not  
appearing;

Having heard the Public Prosecutor in his charge;  
Whereas by writ dated April 5<sup>th</sup> 1913 the  
native Kalmet did summon before this Court  
Leir Roux & has himself condemned to  
pay the sum of £16, balance of the price of  
a horse built for the defendant by the plaintiff;  
Formally:

Whereas, on the case being called, Leir Roux  
although duly summoned did not appear & was  
unrepresented; whereas, then, default should  
be pronounced against him Leir Roux for  
non-appearance;
